Stark Soil and Water values the importance of conservation education to Stark County residents of all ages. In order to enhance awareness to our citizens we provide programs, activities, events, and materials to communities. We have a variety of topics on which we may provide information, as well as accept requests for program topics. Teachers may contact Soil and Water to schedule free interactive programs for students based on the topics of soil, water, and natural resource conservation. All activities are aligned, by grade level, with Ohio's New Learning Standards.

Conservation Education Program Offerings:

- Free to any school within Stark County
- Available for students from Kindergarten to High School
- Aligned with the Ohio New Learning Standards
- Focus on the topics of soil, water, and the conservation of natural resources.
- Programs are designed for 30 participants, but can be adapted for other group sizes
- Program lengths vary from 30-60 minutes and can be scheduled to fit your needs
- Interactive, hands-on, and fun!

Programs are scheduled on a first come first served basis and are limited to availability.

Resource Distribution:

(Note: Entries with student handwriting and coloring will score better than those designed, drawn, and colored by adult assistance.)

Shaping the Future of Education in Ohio: Review and Respond to Ohio's Strategic Plan

During the last six months, the State Board of Education and the Ohio Department of Education have engaged more than 150 partners from preK-12, higher education, business, philanthropy, community and the state legislature to craft a comprehensive strategic plan for education. This is the first prepared by the state in more than a decade.

Eleven regional stakeholder meetings will be held to review the plan and receive targeted feedback that will inform the final draft of the plan. These meetings are an opportunity to gather valuable input from various perspectives, including local educators, funders, parents, students and community members. The meeting will include an introduction from State Superintendent Paolo DeMaria, a brief overview of the draft plan and group discussions around specific provisions and options.
